# Why Bronze?



The Bronze award is a national award that encourages:

- Leadership skills: By designing and carrying out project girls gain leadership experience
- Community connections: Getting to know community Change makers opens doors for the future
- Being a role model to younger Girl Scouts
- Making the world a better place and following the Girl scout Law



## **Getting Started**

- Step 1: Complete the Training module
- Step 2: Review the Bronze awards Guidelines & Resources from GSUSA
- Step 3: make sure you have a Junior Journey done as a prerequisite
- Step 4: choose your team
  - Can Be a whole troop, small group, or an individual girl working with an outside team
- Step 5: Start Planning & Brainstorming

#### Do some research!

Here are a few ideas you might use to come up with a Bronze award Take Action project idea

- What sort of Project would benefit an issue you care about?
- Talk to people
  - Are there any groups you know that might need help? Can you ask them what sort of change or project might be helpful to them?
  - Meet with an organization you are interested in and ask them what sort of projects would be helpful to them
- Look around your community for things that could be improved!
  - Your community might be small, like a neighborhood, or a wider community, like the state. You decide!





#### What is Take Action?

Take Action projects pick up where that short-term fix of the service project leaves off. There are three key components to Take Action projects—girls show active leadership by working with the community, they address the root cause of an issue (think of the "why" behind the issue), and the projects have a lasting impact.



# Take Action vs. Community Service

#### A Take Action Project:

- Will be long lasting
- Will help fix the root of the issue
- Will create change
- Will be sustainable
- Will inspire and educate others
- Will be measurable

#### **Community Service:**

- Is short term
- Might only be a 1 day event
- Will only help at the surface
- Won't address bigger issues
- Won't inspire larger change
- Helps people but hard to track the effects



#### Turning a service project into a Take Action Project

Participate in a park clean-up.

Work with the city to implement a new recycling program at the park. Then, work to organize an annual park clean-up with others in the community.

A local animal rescue group has a Making blankets and toys to donate to a local lot of dogs and cats in their care. animal rescue group.


Help prevent pet over-population by creating a PSA or poster campaign for local spay and neuter programs.



#### Make a Plan

Here' are some ideas you might use to start planning for your project

- Come up with some SMART Goals
  - Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, and Time based
- Create an ideal timeline for your project
- Create a budget for your project, What are people donating? What supplies are needed? Where will the money needed come from?





## Starting your Project

- If multiple girls are working on the project each girl should be responsible for a specific piece so she can gain leadership skills.
- Spread the word! Let people know what you are doing and see if they want to help!
- Track hours individually so each girl knows how many she has done!
- Form to fill out if your project is to benefit a GSU Property
- Take pictures and have fun!

# Finishing your project

- Each girl should complete a minimum of 20 hours on the project.
- Use the Bronze Award rubric to make sure your project meets all the guidelines
- Submit your report to GSU
