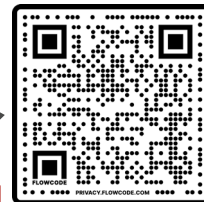


PET FIRE SAFETY



Pledge to create a safer environment for your pets

Fire Prevention



- Do not leave your pet(s) unattended with an open flame.
- Remove or cover knobs to appliances your pet(s) could run into and turn on.
- Secure pet(s) in a proofed area such as in a crate or behind a baby gate where they can be easily located in case of an emergency.
- Secure wires behind furniture and secure fire hazards such as lamps and space heaters from tipping.

Emergency Plans



- Keep collars with identification and other important information on your pet(s) and leashes nearby as animals become difficult to handle when frightened.
- Put up a decal stating the number of pets in your window and update information frequently.
- Ensure your fire department is equipped with pet oxygen masks.
- Practice evacuation plans with your pet(s).

During A Fire



- Get yourself to safety and leave the door open behind you to leave an escape route for the pet(s).
- Do not delay escape to locate your pet(s).
- Never attempt to re-enter the building.
- Call for your pet(s) to encourage them to come outside.
- Notify the firefighters that there are pet(s) inside.

Aftercare



- Signs of smoke inhalation include difficulty breathing, increased rate of breathing, coughing, agitation, etc.
- If possible, at the scene administer oxygen through a pet oxygen mask, human oxygen mask, or oxygen tubing held to it's nose.
- Seek immediate attention from a veterinarian even if the pet seems to be doing well at first.
